## **Building Disciples**

My goal for this year is to help families teach, grow, and share their faith at home, and eventually with others. I think most of you will agree that it's not that we don't know WHAT to share with our kids, but HOW to start talking about faith in a way that builds relationships with each other and with God. This will not be a one-time learning experience, but we have to start somewhere. So where? And how? Great questions! Join me (and others) on Sunday nights in April as we begin Family Discipleship 101.

Before I move on, let's talk about that title because maybe the word discipleship is intimidating or confusing. In the Christian sense, discipleship simply means to follow Jesus Christ. Everything involved in discipleship is spelled out in the Bible. But in today's world, that path is not always an easy one.

In March, I mentioned that there are practical ways we can begin to teach our kids about Jesus using simple faith tools. Some of those include daily quiet time, obedience, trusting Him, worship, reading His Word, tithing, fasting, and showing His love to others.

I previously highlighted daily quiet time with Jesus, so this month let's focus on loving others. There are a lot of verses that tell us that Jesus calls us to love one another. I John 4:7-8, John 15:12, Luke 6:31, 1 Corinthians 16:14, and Proverbs 17:17 are a few.

There are several ways we can take action to show Jesus' love. First, be the example. Kids are always watching, so they will learn how to love others by observing you. Random acts of kindness go a long way, as do family service projects. Help a neighbor, a grandparent, or a friend. If you need ideas, let me know. Finally, there are simple actions that kids can do to show love to others - say kind words, open doors, pray for someone, give a hug, come to church! There are so many ways to show the love of Jesus, and it's a good idea to talk with kids to reinforce the concept and discuss the impact of their actions.

In conclusion, I really want to encourage you to sign up to attend 1, 2, or all 3 sessions of *Family Discipleship 101*. If you have any roadblocks keeping you from coming, please let me know if I can assist. This is not to place an extra burden on you, but instead is going to help you with the most important thing we can do as parents – share the love of Jesus Christ with our kids.

### Renewal and Anticipation by Pastor Bobby

As we bask in the joy of Easter and the celebration of Jesus Christ's resurrection, we are reminded of the beautiful parallels between this season of renewal and the profound hope we have in our faith. Just as the earth is renewed in spring, so too are our lives renewed by the power of Christ's resurrection.

Spring is also a season of anticipation. As we witness the gradual transformation of the world around us, we are reminded of the promise of Christ's return. Just as we eagerly await the full bloom of spring, so too do we eagerly await the fulfillment of God's kingdom and the restoration of all things.

The resurrection of Jesus gives us hope not only for our own lives but for the entire world. It is a reminder that no matter how dark the winter may seem, spring will always come. Similarly, no matter how hopeless our situations may appear, the hope of resurrection is always present.

As we move forward from Easter into the season of spring, let us carry with us the hope and joy of Christ's resurrection. Use scrap paper to fuel new growth and make a gift that keeps on giving.

#### What you need:

- Scrap paper
- Water
- Herb or flower seeds
- Blender
- Strainer
- Cookie sheet
- Towel
- Adult help

#### What you do:

- 1. Tear the scrap paper into strips and place in a bowl. Cover the paper with water and let it soak overnight.
- 2. Pour the mixture into a blender and blend about 10 seconds.
- 3. Strain and squeeze the paper pulp to remove excess water. Place in
- 4. Sprinkle seeds over the pulp and mix to incorporate them into the pulp.
- 5. Shape the pulp into a flat layer on the cookie sheet. Use a towel to soak up excess water. Allow the paper to dry completely.
- 6. Tear paper into shapes or fold into a card. You can plant the paper directly into soil. Water it and then watch your plants grow!

## **Superimposed Love**

Maybe you've heard how salvation is like a total solar eclipse: God doesn't see our sins because Jesus' holiness covers them completely. Or maybe you've heard how trials can cause an "eclipse of faith."

At WorldChallenge.org, Pastor Gary Wilkerson explains that in Greek, eclipse means "I am absent" or "I cease to exist," because people once thought the gods temporarily extinguished the sun. "For Christians, a 'spiritual eclipse' is a dark hour when God seems to be absent from our lives," Wilkerson writes.

Wilkerson points to Peter being sifted like wheat, Elijah and Jeremiah facing extreme discouragement, and David collapsing

morally. Amid Satan's attacks, "God seems completely absent," writes the pastor. "In that dark moment of eclipse, the devil has created such chaos we can't possibly see a way out." During times of testing, Christians must cry out to God and trust his faithfulness.

Completing the eclipse analogy, Wilkerson shares Titus 3:4, the "love of God our Savior appeared" (NIV). The Greek meaning of appeared here is superimposed, he writes. God looks on our fraught-filled times of eclipse and "superimposes his divine love over us."



#### When it Rains

The skeleton flower, a perennial native to Japan, has delicate petals that change from opaque white to almost transparent when wet. After it rains, only the flower's intricate, skeleton-like veins are visible.

When the rains come (and they will!) in our lives, the same can be said. Amid difficulty and struggle, our true selves often become more transparent. During a parenting challenge, criticism might emerge. Or while we tackle a tough work project, impatience might rear its ugly head.

Hosea 6:3 (NLT) proclaims: "Oh, that we might know the Lord! Let us press on to



know him. He will respond to us as surely as the arrival of dawn or the coming of rains in early spring." The rains will come. Whether you're experiencing light rain or a downpour, ponder what the water reveals. Then ask God how you can be more open to his work in that
