Minutes from Last Year's Congregational Meeting held January 22,2023

After determining a quorum, Rev. Dr. Bobby Griffith called the Annual Ecclesiastical Congregational Meeting of the Westfield Presbyterian Church to order at 12:37 p.m. with scripture and prayer. (Ezekiel 37:5)

Rev. Griffith spoke to our vision for 2023 for Westfield Presbyterian Church. Highest rate of people that have no religion at all. And yet God calls us to speak life to a world that is dry and dusty. God has the power to breathe life where it seems like there is death.

A motion was made to appoint Karen Matsukas as Clerk for the meeting, seconded and passed unanimously.

Let's talk about 2023. This year feels like we have some things we need to do together: by-laws changes, the building project re-visited. God calls us to step out in faith and follow Him.

The minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting were available in printed form for review. A motion to approve last year's minutes was made by Lee Ann, seconded by Wendell, unanimously approved by the congregation.

Proposed changes to Bylaws. Keith, the outgoing chair of the Nominating committee, outlined and explained the proposed changes.

1. Remove the Women of Westfield representative from the nominating committee. *Rationale*: this was a request by WOW.

This motion passed unanimously.

- 2. From ARTICLE V. Add word ordinarily
 - Section 5 The Nominating Committee **ordinarily** shall nominate at least one nominee for each vacant position of the Session and Board of Deacons to be elected. Anyone who has the right to vote for these offices may make nominations from the floor.
- 3. From ARTICLE VII. Add word ordinarily.
 - Section 2 The Board of Trustees **ordinarily** shall consist of twelve members to be elected by the congregation/corporation for a term of three years, four being elected each year and that after serving a full term of three years as Trustee, no Trustee shall be eligible to be re-elected as Trustee until one year has elapsed, this being in accordance with the form of ECO's polity, and the rotary system of this church.

Minutes from Last Year's Congregational Meeting (continued)

4. From ARTICLE VII add word ordinarily

Section 2 The Nominating Committee **ordinarily** shall nominate at least one nominee for each member of the Board of Trustees to be elected. Covenant Partners may make additional nominations from the floor.

**Retionals: In the outside change the Nominating Committee cannot field four people.

Rationale: In the outside chance the Nominating Committee cannot field four people who will agree to serve in these roles, this allows the committee the ability to decide to stop and allow the Holy Spirit to work. The vacancies will allow the board the decision to request a new member if needed.

A motion to change the Bylaws as stated above (2.,3.,4.) was brought forth, motion carries.

5. Amend Articles IV:4:D, IV:4: E and VII:5 to allow board members to serve a second consecutive term, not exceeding six years total, and undergo the same nominating procedures as outlines in Articles V and VII.

Rationale: In the event someone is nominated for a second term, this allows for that possibility.

A motion to change the Bylaws as stated above (5.) was brought forth, Ayes have it.

6. Require members of the nominating committee to be Covenant Partners for at least two years prior to serving on the nominating committee.
Rationale: This allows the nominating committee to have members who have had a chance to get to know potential officers.

A motion to change the Bylaws as stated above (6.) was brought forth and passed unanimously.

The Nomination and election of congregational members for the Nominating Committee commenced. All active members are available for nomination except those presently serving as active elders, deacons, or trustees, and those who served last year as a congregational representative on the committee. Seven were nominated and a motion was made to close with much discussion following against closing the nominations. The nominations were tabled. A motion was made to change 7 members from congregation to 8 members from congregation on nominating committee, seconded and approved. Then nominations were re-opened and the Nominations from the floor were:

A motion by Dave Trotter to close the nominations and to elect the nominees to the committee was made; seconded by Jim Bailey and passed unanimously.

A motion to appoint these nominees to the Nominating Committee by Sam Vastano approved seconded by Justin Young and approved unanimously.

Financial Health and 2023 Budget:

The printed budget was reviewed.

The Statistical report was presented and reviewed.

Report of the Auditors:

Brenda Stewart reported that a review of the financial records was successful, and the auditors found the records to be in good order.

Nomination and Election of 2024 Auditor:

Corey Thomas was nominated. A Motion to close nominations was made by Sam Vastano; seconded by Lee Ann Byers; and unanimously approved.

Old Business: None

New Business:

A motion to approve the minutes of the 2023 Minutes made by Sam Vastano seconded by Debbie Liggett and voted unanimously.

A motion to adjourn was made by Eric Stewart; seconded by Jim Bailey; and unanimously approved by the congregation.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:45 p.m. and closed with prayer.

Pastor's Report submitted by Pastor Bobby Griffith

In my report last year, I said that the word describing 2022 was *maintain*. 2022 seemed to fly by in a quick blur and became 2023 in no time flat. For 2023, I want to say **forward** might be a good descriptor.

We moved forward with incredible worship services, beginning the year with two differently styled gatherings. We transitioned back into one service in late May that combined old and new music in a tasteful way. Our Easter and Christmas Eve services were powerful, awe-inspiring worship.

We moved forward with a different model of leadership structure. For sure, there has been a bit of a learning curve. That happens with any change. In my mind, the flexibility allowed us to make it easier to have newer events and have more folks volunteer.

This year saw us move forward with the largest VBS in recent memory. Our kids' ministry has certainly been a highlight for Westfield. Sunday School participation has been steady, and there has been numerical growth in the youth aged Sunday School class.

Our most significant move forward has to be the building addition. You all approved it in 2017. We signed the paperwork in September 2023. Ground broke shortly thereafter. We now have the makings of an 8600 square foot addition that will be a wonderful hub for ministry. This would have never happened without the faith of so many of you who have given generously. Thank you.

In reflecting on 2023, I want to highlight a few things that meant a lot to me. First, we have so many good leaders at Westfield. The content Delta Stoner provides the communicants' class is incredible. Marcia Votaw, Bruce Harman, and Dave Liggett have been invaluable for getting Foundations of Hope back on track. Carol Robb and Sue McCurley proved to be incredible voices of wisdom for me. I know there are many, many more folks I can recognize. Second, our staff has had a spirit of unity. Garrett has been fantastic as our music team leader. Our Thursday JOY meetings have grown under Jessie's leadership. Jennifer has created new Bible studies in her role as kid ministries director. Maribeth's patience and persistence makes life easier for everyone. We have a great team that wants to work together and enjoys serving this congregation.

As we think about 2023, we have much for which to be grateful. It was a good year financially. There has been an energetic atmosphere on Sundays. We celebrated baptisms and first communions. We mourned the loss of long-time church members together. We saw God protect and preserve the unity of Westfield Presbyterian Church.

What's in Store for 2024?

We want to focus on our core values of Know Christ (worship), Share Christ (community), and Love Christ (outreach) and make ministry decisions and commitments based on those. As we do that, we hope that we will improve in all areas. We also want to be good stewards of our property, finances, and ministry focuses so we follow God's will as best as possible.

Personally, my biggest prayer for 2024 is for us to start strong when we have our grand opening for the building addition. This building is not just for us, but for the community. It can help us connect with people in our community who do not attend any worship. Over 60% of our community is not worshipping on the weekend. It's up to us to go and make disciples. Our core values incorporate this mission into who we want to be.

For 2024, we have sermon series planned that will cover topics like Discipleship, the book of Daniel, Jude, Ephesians, and more. I am hopeful these spark interest for folks to engage the Scriptures. I am also leading a study through the book of Hebrews from January until we are done. I am working with our Presbytery to create a leadership course that we can offer for potential deacons and elders. We are also working on creating more opportunities to be together, some type of men's ministry, and getting our staffing squared away.

What are our values

Know Christ – we are a community centered upon the vibrant worship of the Triune God.

Love Christ – we are a community that cares for one another.

Share Christ – we are a community that reaches out to others to share the love of Jesus.

What potential roadblocks exist in 2024?

We can forget this is God's work and think Westfield is "ours" and not His.

We can be arrogant and trust in our history, financial stability, and stable leadership which leads us not to take risks.

We can have a "since we built it, they will come" mentality, instead of investing in people.

We can be prideful in our pursuit of excellence in worship and ministry.

We can forget to pray for our leaders.

We can see a need and say, "that's someone else's job."

We can forget the vision and mission of Westfield. We substitute other agendas as our core and foundation. We don't give and can't fund this work. We think it's someone else's job to fund the church.

We can forget to say "thank you" to those who are leading and serving on committees or in worship, Sunday School, or other ministries.

We can get caught up in the partisan nonsense of a Presidential election year and trade God's kingdom vision for a small national one.

What are our goals for 2024?

We are praying for 5% more giving.

We are praying for unity in the mission and vision of the church.

We are praying for a wonderful grand opening for the building addition.

We are praying for a larger VBS than last year.

We are praying for new ministry opportunities in the community.

How can we do this?

We become rooted in the reality of Christ's unyielding love for us and move forward confidently because of him.

We show up on Sunday and make worship a priority if we are able to physically attend.

We invite people to worship at Westfield and be a part of our community.

We visit folks who are not able to attend weekly.

We care for others and make a phone call, send a text or card, or make a meal.

We open our homes and build deep, abiding relationships.

We pray for our church, our leaders, and our ministries.

We commit to giving financially to the church if we have not already done so.

We participate in the culture of care that exists at Westfield and help it expand.

It was established by individuals representing five churches in our community, one of which is Westfield Church. It is not uniquely affiliated with any one church or denomination. Yet a collective faith in Jesus Christ drives its existence. Its desire is to extend the love of Christ outside the walls of the Church. Westfield members continue to staff, volunteer, and patronize this local community coffee house. Westfield should be proud to be involved in this local gem, that shares the light of Christ with our community.

2023 saw the loss of older members who were cherished by our congregation. We were deeply moved and saddened by many of these losses and heaven's gain. This year also saw a whole new generation of young people get involved and serve Westfield Church in big, meaningful ways. The future looks brighter than ever for Westfield Church as we continue to pursue knowing Christ, serving Christ, and sharing Christ.

This was my third year as the Director of Children & Family Ministries here at Westfield, and I just love the opportunity to watch the kids grow in stature and faith. Getting to know their families is an even bigger blessing. We were busy again this year with many celebrations, worship and service opportunities, and still had lots of fun together. In Sunday school, we are in year 3 of The Gospel Project for Kids which is a chronological Bible study that points the kids to the gospel of Jesus, and the plan of redemption, throughout all of Scripture. We continue to set a goal of having all kids (ages 2-18) learning the same portion of scripture each week and provide resources to the parents so they can reinforce the lessons at home, as well as learn along with us.

- "Where's the Word?" was our summer Bible reading challenge for the kids here at Westfield. It was a resource that helped kids and families read the Bible in different and fun places.
- Wonderful Wednesdays at Westfield this was our summer midweek program in 2023. It covered 3 weeks in July and was called "Exploring God's Creation Land, Sky, and Sea."

You have the option to personally fill in and plant grass on a grave site. If you choose to do this, remember to leave sufficient time for the ground to settle.

Cemetery plots are for sale to members and non-members and are not transferable. The price is determined by the Board of Trustees. Upon the sale of a plot, a certificate of ownership is given designating the plot location. Plots cannot be sold back to the church, they can only be donated to the church or to someone else.
