
If you would like to participate, please sign up on the poster provided in the back of the church. Participants are asked to be set up and ready to go by 2:00 before the

Many of these children, whether or not they understand all the items in the box, can still enjoy opening a gift. They know someone is thinking about and praying for them. As they are introduced to the Greatest Journey program, they are being exposed to an opportunity to make a commitment to Jesus, which they may never get otherwise. Be a part of these children's lives. When you think you are done, 'PACK JUST ONE MORE".







Christian Symbol: Water

- 8. What's something enjoyable you get to experience every day that you've come to take for granted?


- 9. What's a hard lesson that you were grateful to learn?
