

Lenten Signals

Why should we observe Lent? This 40-day season of repentance and reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday has three important purposes. Lent helps us STOP, LOOK and LISTEN.

We observe Lent because it tells us to STOP and rest awhile — and to stop sinning. Lent tells us to LOOK inward for an honest self-examination, to look upward to see the cross of Jesus with healing and love,



and to look forward to the hope of the Resurrection. And we observe Lent because it tells us to LISTEN — to the voice of God, the words of Christ and the movement of the Holy Spirit.

STOP, LOOK and LISTEN! These commands that are so crucial for travel safety are also important for our journey through Lent.

Ready for a Cosmic Adventure?

This year's Vacation Bible School is "Stellar" and it is a space theme. Get ready for planets, spaceships, and asteroids to take over the church in June!

As we begin planning, this year we will be relying on our generous Westfield family for donations. You all have saved us so much money with the donations of snacks in the past, and this year, we also will be asking for "scholarships." As you know, the cost of everything is much higher than it was before, and the cost to run a successful VBS is nearly \$5000 (which is the entire budget for the year for children's

ministries.) For example, t-shirts are \$6 per child. Still a bargain, but for 120 kids, that's \$720. Maybe you want to pay for everyone's t-shirts—that would be huge!! That's just one example.

He Directs Our Steps by Pastor Bobby

When I worked at UPS during seminary, we had this phrase drilled in our heads as managers: plan your work and work your plan. The idea behind that is if you have a plan, when adversity comes you will be able to meet it head on. They probably got that idea from Dwight Eisenhower who said, "plans are useless, but planning is everything."

Typically, we start out a new year with plans or goals. This is the year to be debt free. This is the year to get in shape. This is the year to run a marathon, have the perfect lawn, or finally take a relaxing vacation. We have other plans, too, I am

sure. Get better at meal planning, organize the garage, call the long lost aunt or uncle.

Then there are times of crisis, or the moment the plan doesn't work. But is it wrong to have a plan? No!! We need them. God made us to be organizers; it reflects him. But it is also important not to get so caught up in plans that we are stuck in our ways, or devastated when things don't go how we want. Remember Proverbs 16:9 "The heart of man plans his way, but the Lord establishes his steps."

It's Okay to Be Human

An important theme of the Lenten season is the humanity of Christ. In Jesus, God became human and fully experienced the wide range of emotions we all encounter in life. Jesus experienced times of loneliness, sadness, hurt, anger, disappointment, grief, and abandonment. That is part of being human. Another part of being human is needing help from each other. God never intended us to be completely self-sufficient. Part of God's plan is for each of us to turn to others for help when we need it.

But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves. For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man who looks intently at his natural face in a mirror. For he looks at himself and goes away and at once forgets what he was like. But the one who looks into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and perseveres, being no hearer who forgets but a doer who acts, he will be blessed in his doing. (James 1:22-25)
